A Message from Headmaster Johnson

## Dear Parents,

You have just got to love the beautiful! What's beautiful is witnessing our scholars learning and enjoying life. We have hosted many fun on and off campus events lately. Latin Club did well in a recent competition, and we have expanded our offerings of fun evening events to include Trivia Night, Dances, Talent Shows, and Band and Chorus Concerts. Our soccer teams are doing well, and our twirlers and cheerleaders have led the way in many recent competitions. Our senior scholars attended Grad Night, and we are preparing for our Inaugural Commencement Ceremony in May. I love it!

With much business comes the refining of our policies and operations. We have had several questions about the volunteer vetting process that I would like to address. This past year, Lions Council has been helping with the vetting of our volunteers through background checks. This service has fees that the State of Florida collects, and that Lions Council must cover. The volunteers, therefore, have been asked to help with the costs. In the past, there have not been fees required as we have only used the Raptor screening tool.

So, what is the difference between coming on campus and receiving Raptor scans with your driver's license versus a background check? A Raptor scan only flags sex offenders, while the State of Florida screening is a more in-depth criminal background check. We are immensely concerned about the safety of our scholars and have determined that most of our parents agree with the new requirement of a criminal background check for those who are working with their children. We have also had wonderful responses from our parents who have chosen to volunteer despite the requirement to be fully vetted beforehand. Moving forward into the 2022-2023 school year, this in-depth screening will be required for all those working on campus, in a classroom, or as an on-campus or off-campus field trip chaperone.

I hope this clarifies our policy for on-and-off campus volunteers. We owe it to our parents to provide the safest environment possible to their children. Thank you for entrusting your children to us. I will provide more information to families through our weekly St Johns Classical Academy Podcast. Be sure to listen to learn about the latest from our school. Have a great Spring!

## Summer Plans

Summer is right around the corner. While some scholars start their summer countdown with eager anticipation in January, others look at the long days of summer as an endless wasteland of boredom. I experienced this dread myself as a child, and more recently as a parent. My children hated the long, structureless days of summer even to the point of panic attacks.

One year I had an idea, which was partially inspired by Pinterest. What is the big difference between the school year and summer? Structure. I called my family in for a meeting and laid out the plan.

Instead of long days of mindless tv binging, we would have a schedule. The first requirement was that everyone would get up by a certain time. Because it was summer, this wasn't early by normal standards, but it was not after lunch either. After breakfast, the morning was divided into blocks. They would spend 30 minutes to an hour each on math, reading, and a project of their choice. One year, one child decided to learn the 50 states and their capitals. Another learned the flags of Europe. They also had to go outside every day, weather permitting. After lunch, when it was hottest, we would have nap/quiet time for an hour (sometimes two), quiet screen time, and free play. One of our favorite activities was "Reading Club," which consisted of us all curling up on the couch with books and snacks. Occasionally we might share what we were reading, but mostly we were just all reading together. It's probably one of my fondest summer memories. While some might recoil in horror at the idea of having their summer days so strictly mapped out, my children met my plans with enthusiasm and relief. Finally, they would have something to do!

Another reason to schedule your days is "the summer slump". Children put their books down in May or June, and don't pick them up again until August. We have all heard that "practice makes perfect." The more accurately practice makes permanent. Our brains see memories like buildings in a field. The more frequently you make a trip out to a particular building, the more permanent the path is. Similarly, the more frequently you ask your brain to access a memory, the easier it is to access that memory. Without any traffic over the summer, those paths in your child's brain get quickly overgrown, and some of the newer ones may disappear entirely. To combat this, it is important to continue to practice basic skills. In elementary and middle school, your child should be practicing their math facts daily. They should be able to continue to access iXL throughout the summer, so they can also review previously assigned strands or try new ones. The school also has copies of Primary Math workbooks available for sale.

Reading is another crucial skill to maintain. Read to your child, have them read to you, and ask them questions about what they are reading. Start with the basic "who, when, where" questions, then move on to more abstract questions like "why do you think that happened?", or "how would you react in this situation?" Some great series to read together, which would appeal to many different ages, are Madeline L'Engle's Wrinkle in Time series and C. S. Lewis's Chronicles of Narnia. The SJCA website also has a page of book recommendations and other suggestions of things to work on over the summer. This is also the perfect time to nurture your child's spirit of investigation and sense of wonder. Encourage your child to have a "nature journal" where they can write and draw observations while on nature walks, beach days, or laying on a blanket looking at the stars. If you plan on traveling, see if there is a Revolutionary or Civil War battlefield near where you are going - you can read about Saratoga or Andersonville in a book, but it is so much more impactful when you see it first-hand.

I know the idea of structuring summer this way may seem daunting, especially if you are working or traveling. The good thing is that you can make your schedule as flexible as you need it to be. Work in the mornings? Those can be your children's down times, and they can do school work in the afternoons. If you have a family outing or vacation planned, it is fine to skip those days. The important thing is not to have every moment of every day carved in stone, rather a loose framework of what could happen during those times. Having a plan eases the transition from the intense structure of summer and helps the return to school not be so jarring.

I hope that some of these suggestions prove useful to you and help you provide have a fun, educational summer.

## Scholars with Meds in Health Room

All medications in the clinic must be picked up by a parent before last day of school. The clinic will be open during school hours in May and until 12:30 the last three half days of school. Any medications that are not picked up will be discarded.

Returning scholars with a health condition requiring medication to be kept in the health room will need new 2022-2023 paperwork filled out with a signed order from a health care provider. Medications will not be accepted at orientation unless paperwork is complete. Please be sure medications are not expired and labeled with your scholar's name. Prescription drugs must be in original packaging/bottle with the pharmacy label. Any over-the-counter meds must be new in package as well.

## Scholars with Health Conditions

Our goal is to maintain an optimal learning environment and that starts with physically and mentally healthy scholars. Confidential zoom, phone, or in-person conferences with the school nurse can be requested at any time during the school year to further discuss your child's health condition. Scholars spend a lot of time at our school, and we strive to be prepared for any possible situations or emergencies.

## Kindergarten and New Scholar Requirements

Incoming kindergarteners and all new scholars are required by the State of Florida to have a DH 3040 school entry physical exam dated within the past calendar year and completed DH 680 (Certificate of Immunization). If you have a new scholar starting this Fall, please have required forms signed by a health care provider as soon as possible. New scholar registration will begin May 1st, and all completed forms must be uploaded by May 20, 2022, to ensure they keep their seat.

## $7^{\text {th }}$ Grade Requirements

All returning scholars entering $7^{\text {th }}$ grade will also need a recent Tdap (tetanus). Scholars will not be allowed on campus without a completed DH 680 or DH 681 (Religious Exemption) form signed by a health care provider. This is required by the State of Florida for all adolescents entering seventh grade.
