Accreditation Update

Accreditation is defined as, "a voluntary method of quality assurance developed more than 100 years ago by American universities and secondary schools and designed primarily to distinguish institutions adhering to a set of educational standards and policies" (Cognia, 2020, p. 1). SJCA is seeking to become accredited through Cognia. We are hosting the Engagement Review from November 1st-3rd, which will be conducted remotely; therefore, interviews with stakeholders will be done online.

The accreditation process allows us to demonstrate our commitment to school improvement. Cognia will analyze every facet of our organization over the coming months to determine how well SJCA meets the needs of our scholars. According to Cognia, "accreditation isn't about passing a one-time inspection—it helps education providers meet improvement goals and sustain commitments to better learner outcomes" (Cognia, n.d.).

4-H empowers young people to be true leaders. True leaders are young people who have confidence; know how to work well with others; can endure through challenges; and will stick with a job until it gets done. 4-H believes true leaders aren't born: they're grown. The 4-H program's hands-on approach provides young people with guidance, tools, and encouragement, and then places them in the driver's seat to make great things happen.

4-H programs are grounded in the belief that kids learn best by doing. Scholars will complete hands-on projects in areas like science, health, agriculture and citizenship. Scholars will receive guidance from adult mentors in a positive environment and be encouraged to take on proactive leadership roles. Scholars can concentrate on one focus area or they can try a variety of programs throughout their 4-H experience.

The House System is a traditional feature of many European schools in which the school is divided into sub-units called "Houses." Upon entering Upper School, each student is assigned to a house, thus providing a focus for group loyalty and camaraderie. Our House System will split the Upper School (grades 7-12) into four Houses. Each House will contain an equal number of young men and women from all Upper School grades.

Each August, 7th graders will go through a pinning ceremony where their House will be revealed, and they will be presented with a pin to wear each day at school. This year's house pinning ceremony was held on Friday August 20, 2021.

The purpose of the Houses System is to provide a wide array of opportunities for student involvement and participation, as well as for a widely dispersed student government (with leadership and ambassadorship opportunities for those who seek them out). Within their Houses, students will plan and execute school events, foster mentoring relationships between various grades, and develop unique traditions.

Houses will compete for points throughout the year. Students will earn points for academic achievements and character/virtue awards in the classroom and on the athletic field. In addition to academic achievement and virtuous achievements, the Lion Olympics will be held semiannually. The Lion Olympics is a series of academic and athletic competitions held during the school day where students can participate and help their house win the Lion Olympic Cup! At the end of the year, the House with the most points will be presented with the Lion Cup and will reign victorious with their emblem and colors proudly displayed in the cafeteria.

When students graduate, they will have had several years of planning and executive experience. If and when they choose to attend college, they will have the practical knowledge of how to begin clubs and associations, which is one of the core features of strong citizenship. The House System, then, is an education in civics because of the habits it encourages and forms.

<u>What Counts, What Doesn't?</u> Florida Bright Futures Scholarship

In order to qualify for the Florida Bright Futures Scholarships, service hours are required. However, there are rules for what hours count and what hours won't. Below are some general guidelines of what hours do not count for these scholarships.

- Court mandated community service.
- An activity for which a student benefited financially or materially for the community service work.
- All forms of duty within the family. The student's family to include: parents (including step), siblings (including step), any of their grandchildren (including step) and any of their spouses, aunts, uncles, cousins, nieces and nephews.
- Volunteer work for the purpose of promoting a particular religious or political point of view or person cannot count as volunteer hours in this program. For example, if your church youth group helps with the Special Olympics, these hours would count, but NOT time spent distributing flyers advertising a church revival.
- Some common activities which do not count include: altar server, Vacation Bible School, babysitting, working in church nursery, church choir, and clerical work for religious or political organizations.
- An activity where there is no leader or responsible adult on site to evaluate and confirm student performance (i.e., fostering an animal in your home).
- Donations, such as Locks of Love or giving blood.
- Student may not receive academic credit for service work performed.
- An activity performed by a student prior to becoming a high school student or after the student's graduation date. A student is considered a high school student the summer prior to his/her 9th grade year.
- Participation on a sports team or a performance of any kind.





A place to expand students' knowledge on miscellaneous science topics by doing experiments and researching the topic of the meeting.


