## The Song of the City

Last semester, ninth graders studied Logic, which is reasoned argumentation. This semester, they are studying Rhetoric, which is the art of persuasion. Together these arts have been called "the song of the city," a metaphor that resonates with me. We are self-governing citizens of varying nature, experience, and education, living in community. As we reason through the politics of living in this community, we must have lively debate, asking questions and engaging in discussion about our knowledge and experience. This is seeking truth; this is "learn the true" in action.

First, ninth graders have learned about the three rhetorical appeals: ethos (the credibility established by the speaker), logos (the reasoning of the argument), and pathos (the emotion stirred in the audience). They've been interested to learn that, though all three appeals should be present, the speaker's ethos is not simply one third of a good persuasive argument; rather it is almost the whole of persuasion. The speaker establishes her ethos by demonstrating goodwill towards her audience, moral virtue in her actions and ideas, and practical wisdom through her experience.

I gave the ninth graders an assignment: Choose a particular situation and try to persuade someone through ethos alone, simply by establishing your own credibility. One situation was "Convince your grandmother to loan you $\$ 100$ without telling her the reason you need the money." Another was "You are late for a curfew because you helped a friend with an embarrassing matter. When you meet your parents at the door, convince them that their trust in you should not be rattled even though you can't explain the situation." For this assignment, scholars couldn't give a logical argument or stir emotion in the other person. All they could do was extend goodwill, present moral virtue, and show practical wisdom. It was hard. They wanted to give excuses. They found it was difficult to demonstrate moral virtue if you haven't shown virtue in the past. They found that ninth graders with little life experience can't show much practical wisdom. But extending goodwill was particularly difficult. In his Rhetoric, Aristotle spends a lot of time discussing goodwill; it is what makes our audience let down its guard and begin to trust us. Extending goodwill forces us to step into the other person's shoes, consider things from his perspective, and affirm our recognition of his position. For the angry parents scenario, scholars had to recognize the root of the parents' anger-love-which made for some thoughtful rhetoric.

As I listened to them deliver their mini speeches, trying desperately to demonstrate ethos, I thought about how difficult this is for all of us yet how important it is to our living in community. We must seek truth and argue for it; however, we must extend goodwill, be people of virtue who can demonstrate virtue, and speak with practical wisdom about our experiences. Ethos is essential to our song.

March College Checklist

- Make sure testing companies have sent your most recent scores (SAT/ACT) directly to the colleges to which you are applying.
- If needed, register for future GATs or ACTs.
- Begin to organize decision and financial aid forms. The earlier you submit financial aid forms, the better the opportunities.
- You will need to complete a FAFSA form to be eligible for any student aid. Apply Here: https://studentaid.gov/h/apply-for-aid/fafsa
- Complete any additional forms from colleges or interviews and be sure to regularly keep up to date with your acceptance status once submitted.

Be sure to monitor your application status often.

Some colleges may require additional documentation or want to set up an interview.
